Lake County 2050 Community Change Survey Results Kelseyville Area


Introduction

From August 5 through September 13, 2024, a comprehensive survey was conducted in the Kelseyville Area to inform Lake County 2050, the County's General Plan Update. The goal of the survey was to gather input on land use, policy, and related changes to the General Plan. There were also questions included to inform the County's Housing Action and Implementation Plan (HAIP), which are summarized separately here: lakecounty2050.org/documents.

The survey was available in English and Spanish and promoted on the Lake County 2050 project website (LakeCounty2050.org), in canvasing activities administered by County staff and AmeriCorps service members, and at public events. A total of 127 community members participated in the survey, though participants did not necessarily respond to each question. Following is a summary of results, including a listing of responses to openended and "other" questions.



Question 1: Do you consider yourself a member of any of the following groups? (Select all that apply)













Question 6: Should mixed use development (i.e., development that includes both commercial and residential uses) be allowed in Commercial designations?













- Addressing blight would be a very basic but necessary place to begin. All the rest of this is icing on the cake.
- Environmental preservation! And friendly to people with disabilities.

- Bike/walking path utilizing already beautiful spaces (Kelsey Creek, North Main Street etc) tie in areas that have already committed financially to our area i.e. Mercantile.
- This does not mean high-density housing is not a priority. Other housing options should be considered (e.g. shared housing among unrelated, mixed-age individuals). Preserving small town feel should not ban energy efficiency, conservation measures (e.g. solar panels, reflective paint to improve heat reflection).

- Create walkways along natural resources, like Kelsey creek connecting the big valley reservation with the township


Question 13: What should the County do to improve roadway safety for all users, including drivers, bicyclists, and pedestrians? (Select all that apply)


Question 14: How should the County improve the sustainability of the transportation network and support access to transit? (Select all that apply)


Question 15: How should the County protect, preserve, and manage historic and cultural resources? (Select all that apply)


Question 16: How should the County protect and manage its open spaces and preserve its natural beauty? (Select all that apply)

Question 17: How should the County amplify the area's indigenous history, support indigenous traditions, and collaborate with indigenous communities? (Select all that apply)



Question 18: How should the County mitigate illegal dumping and other nuisance issues? (Select all that apply)



- How will illegal dumping be fined? It's dumped illegally so no one would see. But clean it up, ASAP rather than allow it to stay indefinately.
- Community action plans emphasizing neighbors helping neighbors and getting kids involved to sustain responsible behaviors works!
- Fund programs already in place, use any "justice" finds to pay employees better and increase staffing and retention
- Increase free drop off of large items like mattresses, box springs and other furniture. Expand CRV refunds
 by requiring businesses that sell bottles and cans with a CRV deposit to also be able to accept empty
 bottles and cans to return the deposit to consumers. Currently there is not a reliable way for residents to
 get the deposit back. Line a Robinson Rancheria is long. No place in Lakeport or Kelseyville to get reviling
 of deposit
- Increase CRV recycling locations. It should not take an entire day to wait in line at the rancheria just to recycle some cans and bottles. Provide additional free days for residents to dispose of refuse.

- look for more resources to help in hiring more staff for isssues related


Question 19: How should the County ensure access to healthy food? (Select all that apply)



Question 20: How should the County ensure access to quality health care? (Select all that apply)




- Encourage and support the development on more medical insurance options in the County

- Develop Lake County as a regional health care hub. Work with health care professionals and educators on a grow your own health professionals program. For example, look for best practices and a model cultivating health care professionals (MDs, Physician Assts, RNs, all sorts of nurses, mental health professionals, dental health professionals) among local youth. This effort will involve internships, fellowships, scholarships, mentors.



- Support KPFZ radio as they have been irreplaceable during disasters. Increase their range/stronger signal.
- The coverage for both cellular and internet in rural areas is terrible and inexcusable. The Safeway in LP should not be a cellular dead zone but it is. Do not allow any exclusive/monopolistic permits to providers. Require all providers to deliver high speed internet service (as defined by the FCC) to all residents. Require all carriers that provided DSL and no longer provide DSL (read:ATT) to either leave the county completely or provide fiber to all that lost service. Consider Municipal Broadband.
- We need more cell towers. The corridor on Hwy 20 from Clearlake to Williams is unacceptable. Kelseyville to Lower Lake is spotty at best.
- Residents should be able to participate remotely and in real time in public meetings (e.g. Board of Supervisors, Planning Commission, MACs, etc.).
- Broadband services need to be fiber/wire, not satellite or over the air
- Improve on emergency robo calls and outreach to seniors and disable individuals.
- Make wifi availability to downtown areas.
- Expand the community center to allow for 200+ people events and services.

Question 22: How should the County ensure that residents have access to vital community resources and services? (Select all that apply)




- Focus more on inclusiveness! Lake county should be less status-driven (old supervisor cronies). Please include people with disabilities as we have a large population here.

- ensure by-products and imported materials do not enter waterways


Question 24: How should the County support the tourism economy? (Select all that apply)

Question 25: How should the County support a healthy local economy? (Select all that apply)





Question 26: How should the General Plan work to reduce wildfire risk in the county? (Select all that apply)



- How about the County maintain the roads like they should be doing? Spray the weeds, mow the weeds. They have not done so. Highland Springs park is an abysmal example of lack of management. It's 'unpopular' to talk about weed spraying our roadways, but is a weed spray worse than our county burning? We think not. Do the basics. Mow the weeds or spray them regularly. The County recently purchased several incredibly expensive mowers and yet, drive out to Highland Springs Park and see if those mowers have been used. Also, HSP should be a high priority for prescriptive burns, grazing, something, but something. It's a travesty how the County has ignored the area.
- Work with the tribes who want to implement biomass to electricity converters and require agri-businesses to utilize them as well as the county and the rest of us.
- Control burns and increases fire buffers in populated areas such as the Rivs
- Cal Fire Grants for fire hazard mitigation

- Create and improve evacuation areas and plans that focus on the elderly, people with pets, people with special needs or limitations. County is knowingly ignoring 4290 and 4291 road requirements when granting permits (e.g. cannabis, building) and is often flat-out lying about the quality of the roads in the name of greed even though time and time again, one of the main issues in permit hearings are that the roads are unsafe. If a road has not already been surveyed by an independent surveyor for 4290/4291 compliance, one should be selected by the County to assess the road's safety and the applicant should pay the fee.
 PG&E should be kicked out of the County as they are decades behind in undergrounding lines, tree and pole maintenance and improving grid resiliency
- Vegetation management is needed along roads, vacant lots, undeveloped parcels. New development
 requirements in the survey seem focused on housing tracts built by a developer (e.g. two access point
 minimum for day-to-day access and evacuation). If maintenance of evacuation routes falls to residents
 who live on private roads, policy is needed to ensure that route maintenance occurs. How will funds for
 route maintenance be collected from all neighbors on the private road? Who / what entity will do the work
 to keep the evacuation route clear? And what about unmaintained dirt roads that are not 4290/4291
 compliant?
- Build more firehouses to make insurance affordable
- RTD (Require the Developer) a popular term. again there are already measures in place, we just need to
 enforce what is currently on the books. you can travel through the Kelseyville Rivera and see many lots still
 not cleared, brush everywhere. Cal Fire already has requirements in place, Insurance companies are
 making people clear everything or get dropped. We don't need to REQUIRE anything else. there are plenty
 of requirements already.
- Clear roadway of overgrowth!
- Make sure the County cuts weeds and brush in County owned land. - enforce codes for vegetation management (mowing) and require removal of dead trees and fuel load


Question 27: How should the General Plan address flood risk in the county? (Select all that apply)



- The County ignores 4290 and 4291 road safety compliance when it comes to cannabis. The County should assign an independent surveyor to determine the safety of the road and not the applicant. The cost is still paid by the applicant. One of the main reasons people don't evacuate is because of pets, elderly, disabled and homebound residents. Target programs to address those problems. For example, a person with horses may not have enough trailers for all their animals or enough trucks to tow them even if there was an evacuation zone for livestock.

- Fire safety, vegetation management, fuels reduction. We talk about it all the time, but all you have to do is drive around the county to see we could do so much more to reduce roadside weeds which are so often involved in wildfire. We just lost our house to that very reason. Improve the basics repair our roads, clean up blight, have business-friendly jurisdictions. Basic things that will go a long way toward people's confidence in Lake County.
- Increase planning/community development staffing to reduce permit processing times
- "There shouldn't be environmental review shortcuts for development. Making processes more efficient is fine as long as the environmental review is robust and the community is protected from harms of the proposed development.
- The county doesn't give Lake County enough credit. It can attract professionals, families and individuals who value a high quality of life in a beautiful natural setting. The county's attractiveness will fade if it continues to give away the store and compromise environmental protections for unproven development projects.
- California is in a state of persistent drought. The county needs to be proactive and prepare the public for continued and worsening drought conditions. County residents need to be smarter and more knowledgeable about water usage, water supply and water management. Forget tourism for economic development if the county mismanages groundwater supplies and dry wells and collapsed aquifers become the norm.
- The days of development projects (ag, vineyards, cannabis) operating without oversight on water consumption is not sustainable. If we don't know the capacity of the county's groundwater supplies, finding out needs to be a priority, We can't manage groundwater blindly without relevant data.
- Groundwater management is a thorny and difficult topic. It will require tough discussions and deft leadership, Our future depends on successful negotiation and resolution of water usage issues."
- Some questions need simpler language and more explanation. Current questions ensure Lake County changes are only influenced by the "haves" and purposely exclude the "have-nots." I have a good college education and struggled with this survey!! And by not providing current land use laws or descriptions you ensure only current lawmakers, courts, developers, and property owners can make informed choices. Such blatant manipulation reeks of the racism and prejudice that Lake County leaders continue to demonstrate. Offering the survey is a good step. Now make it fair.
- ""Affordable housing" is a distraction which inflates production costs. ANY new housing construction increases supply and therefore improves housing affordability.
- The long running desire to make Lake County a budget Tahoe has never produced sustainable results. We should focus on attracting manufacturing (we have relatively low land costs) and agricultural processing (bottling plants, canning, etc), the value add creates jobs that aren't just seasonal farm work.
- STOP giving hand outs to big business without contractual obligations to delivery either a specific # of jobs/payroll volume and/or sales tax generated.
- Make businesses that physically operate in the county competitive with online retail, lower sales tax for local businesses and increase sales tax for Web sales (Amazon, etc.) those businesses "
- Permitting with an ordinance that can not be enforced. Article 27 states permittees shall not degrade the Counties air quality. The County has no way to test the air quality for odor control. Cannabis terpenes lead to ozone production which is a health hazard, is bad for tourism and the quality of life for those living close to the grows.
- Change the name from Kelseyville to Konocti.
- All landscaping and new developments need to be native plants
- Cannabis businesses (consumption lounges, dispensaries, special events) should not operate on Rural Lands where roads are not compliant with fire safety requirements. Some neighborhoods on Rural Lands are isolated and remote; safety is an issue when cannabis businesses are prone to theft and violence.
- Expansion of the Community growth boundary was not addressed. Look forward to a conversation or meetings on that. would be nice to see where current sewer and water exist and where it could be expanded to. Currently much of the area on the CGB still has not been developed yet. Still, new areas need to be considered, looking to 2050 and beyond. It should also be noted that we do have a currently functioning general plan. I hope that it will remain something that is for the good of the county. there is a lot being proposed that will add to the complexities of development, costs, etc. Sometimes keeping things simple is a good thing.
